



Greenwald Family leaves Conservation Legacy in Lac du Flambeau

The Doris Greenwald family has left a legacy of enduring conservation value for future generations by protecting over a half mile of natural shoreland on Jerm's Lake in the town of Lac du Flambeau in Vilas County. When Doris passed away last year, daughter Robin Greenwald, executor of the estate, and her sister Linda Dermer, approved the granting of a conservation easement to the Northwoods Land Trust.

Robin Greenwald is an Associate Clinical Professor of Law and the Director of the Rutgers Environmental Law Clinic in New Jersey. "Being at the lake was a time for our family to be together," she said. "We loved the peace and quiet away from the city life."

Protecting the cleanliness of the lake was an important motivation for the family: "We used to be able to see down to the bottom across the whole lake. When my mother passed away, the land value was appraised based on sixteen developable lots," Robin said. "We didn't want the quality of the water to go down with that many more homes on this small lake."

According to Bryan Pierce, NWLT's Executive Director, the easement protects over 3500 feet of shoreland frontage on the 72-acre seepage lake. "Seepage lakes, due to their slow rate of water exchange, are particularly sensitive to development impacts," he noted. "Protecting such a large part of the natural shoreline will help to limit runoff and other development impacts from reducing the high water quality of Jerm's Lake."

Pierce said that nearly 35 acres of northern hardwood and coniferous forest land will also be protected for wildlife habitat and natural plant diversity. The

land is contiguous with Lac du Flambeau Tribal Reservation land on two sides, extending the conservation benefits to a larger block of woodlands.

Northwoods Naturalist John Bates conducted an ecological assessment of the property. "Wildlife values are high on this property, particularly along the undisturbed shoreline," Bates indicated.

According to Greenwald, the land was originally left to Robin's and Linda's grandparents by a Chicago area friend over 60 years ago. The family has had close ties to the property ever since. Their grandfather passed away at the lake when he was 50 years old. He was working on constructing the cabin at the time.

Their parents, Morton and Doris, also loved spending time at the lake with Robin and Linda. “Growing up, it is the only place we ever went on vacation since we were six months old,” said Robin and Linda. “It is an unbelievably great place to spend time as an extended family.”

“My kids now identify the land with my parents,” explained Robin. “I’d like my great, great grandchildren to remember my parents and what they left. The land and beauty of the property keeps them alive.”

Attorney Peter McKeever, Madison, drafted the conservation easement. Included within the easement are provisions to allow the family the flexibility to continue to use the existing cabin and expand it if needed in the future, but subject to size limits. “Linda and I both have two kids, so we wanted to be able to rebuild or allow for a little more space,” said Robin.

“One hundred years from now, I’d like the property to look much like it does today,” she said. “I am delighted that this land will never be developed. Places like this on earth will become much more rare in the future. I am a big open space advocate. Money is a big attraction, but you can never get the land back. Now we know the land will never be developed when we are gone.”

Foundations support the conservation efforts of the Northwoods Land Trust

The Northwoods Land Trust just received word that we are the recipient of an \$11,500 grant from the **Arthur L. "Bud" Johnson in Memory of Elaine V. Johnson Foundation**. The grant will help with a wide variety of technology and other organizational start-up costs. In previous newsletters you may remember our request for donations of a laptop computer and portable LCD projection unit for conducting educational presentations, and a folding table-top display board to enable us to participate in educational events. We also asked for a GPS unit and a high quality digital camera to upgrade our capacity to prepare baseline documentation for the many conservation easements we are working on. The Johnson Foundation Grant will enable us to purchase all new equipment and help us move right to the forefront of technological capacity for our conservation work.

A total of five additional new conservation easement projects will soon be completed thanks to funding support from the **John C. Bock Foundation**. The Northwoods Land Trust has received a grant of \$25,000 this year to help with transaction expenses

related to these five easement donations. The Bock Foundation also provided \$10,000 of funding support last year which helped with landowner expenses for three of our easement donations.

Two of the current conservation easement projects and one previously-accepted easement were also granted funding support from the Northeastern Wisconsin Audubon Society. Working through the **Greater Green Bay Community Foundation**, the Audubon Society's sales of their annual Weather-Friend Calendars support grants through the **Audubon's Land Fund for Wisconsin**. NWLT has received a total of \$800 through two grant cycles to support our conservation projects.

NWLT has also been the recipient of challenge grants from the **American Natural Heritage Foundation**. Focused on helping us build our funding and organizational capacity, Kirk Mueller, Trustee, has provided both financial and technical support. Mueller helped facilitate a Board planning retreat and assessment, and now serves as Co-Chair of our new Council of Trustees.

We greatly appreciate the support of all of these foundations. Their contributions have now leveraged over **\$1 million** of donated appraised value.
