NWLT protects a record 1,650 acres in 2005!

The Northwoods Land Trust had an outstanding year of conserving natural lake and river shorelands, woodlands and wetlands. In just the last couple of weeks in December, we were able to finalize a record ten voluntary land protection agreements with private landowners that permanently protect properties in Vilas, Oneida, Lincoln and Iron counties.

Just one year ago we were celebrating the fact that we had conserved a total of seven properties, providing increased protection to over one mile of natural lake shorelines and 170 acres of conservation lands. With projects on over 1,650 acres completed in 2005, we have now helped landowners conserve eighteen properties protecting a total of 5.7 miles of lake shorelines and about 1.2 miles of natural shorelines on rivers and streams.

Land protection agreements known as conservation easements were completed in the last year on lake and woodland properties in Vilas County with Thomas Turriff in the Town of St. Germain, Thomas and Eileen Pawlacyk and N&M Transfer Co., Inc. in the Town of Plum Lake, Theodosia and Melanie Kern in the Town of Cloverland, and Sally and Bud Schlack in the Town of Land O' Lakes.

Three lake, stream and woodland properties were protected in the Town of Sherman near Springstead in Iron County by DiAnne and Terry Hatch (one new easement and one transfered from Gathering Waters Conservancy) and Meta Reigel. In Oneida County, Walter and Anita Thiede protected over 80 acres and a small "wild lake" in the town of Enterprise, while Don and Sue Kratsch protected part of Nine Mile Creek and Eagle River in the Town of Three Lakes.

Sarah Perry also protected additional lake shorelands and woodlands in the Harrison Hills of Lincoln County. Our sincerest THANKS to all of these landowners who have left an incredible conservation legacy in protecting their family lands for future generations!

Each of these land protection projects was granted as a donation of a conservation easement to the Northwoods Land Trust. Because the land trust is a non-profit, tax-exempt conservation organization, the landowners who make these grants can use the appraised values of the conservation easements as charitable contributions for income tax purposes over a total of a six-year period. Landowners may also receive some estate tax benefits.

John Huppert, NWLT Board President, notes that while these tax deductions may provide some limited financial benefits, the real motivation is that these landowners love their land and want to maintain the natural character of their properties in perpetuity.

Under a land protection agreement, the land remains private property, and can be sold or passed on to heirs for future generations of the families to enjoy. These lands are still subject to property taxes. There is no guarantee that there will be any property tax benefits from a gift of a



conservation easement, however local assessors are required by state statute to take the value of an easement into consideration as they are setting the property assessments.

Huppert feels that one of the major benefits of a land protection agreement is the flexibility it offers to a landowner. Most of the agreements allow for limited new development or expansion of existing homes or other structures on part of the property, while protecting the conservation values of the rest of the site.

Huppert recommended that landowners interested in more information on land protection agreements and other voluntary conservation options should request a copy of "A Landowner's Conservation Guide to Protecting Your Northwoods Property." The guide is available free of charge from the land trust office. The guide includes information on conservation options, tax benefits, land protection agreements, land donations, buying and selling land for conservation, and a conservation registry program. Also included are several profiles of landowners who have worked to protect "wild lakes", undeveloped lake shorelands on mostly developed lakes, working forests and other family lands.

The landowner guide was produced in 2005 with funding assistance from a Wisconsin DNR Lake Protection Grant, the Arthur L. & Elaine V. Johnson Foundation and the John C. Bock Foundation. Additional funding assistance for the land trust and specific conservation projects was provided by the American Natural Heritage Foundation, the Snipe Lake Association and the Greater Green Bay Community Foundation's Audubon Land Fund for Wisconsin.

** 21 acres on Harmony Lake. Located just north of Eagle River in Vilas County, this property has a perpetual Northwoods Land Trust conservation easement on it. The land features about 1,500 feet of natural shoreline frontage on this private lake. Harmony Lake is an 88-acre, clear-water, seepage lake. It has good fishing for largemouth bass and panfish. The frontage is sandy, with tall red pines lining the banks. Harmony Lake is identified as a "wild lake" by the Wisconsin DNR Northern Initiatives: Wild Lakes Program.

There are no buildings of any kind on the property, however the conservation easement allows for a 30,000 square foot building zone to be established (must be surveyed and marked).

The easement allows for construction of one single-family residence

with a maximum total footprint for all structures (including garage, decks, etc.) of 2,500 square feet. Forestry is allowed with an approved management plan, and 18 acres of the property

are currently enrolled in the Managed Forest Law program through 2027. Much of the acreage was cut in 2004, and no additional harvesting is required through the end of the MFL contract.

Please note that the Northwoods Land Trust does not become involved in direct negotiations between potential buyers and sellers. We simply hope to provide a link where appropriate to help conservation-minded sellers and buyers better protect special northwoods properties.
